Neighboring 101

(Witnessing Series - Part II)

And (Jesus) said to them, "Follow me, and I will make you fishers of men." Matthew 4:19

Some years ago, I had the opportunity to read "The Art of Neighboring" by Jay Pathak & Dave Runyon. The premise of the book is one that can be summed up with this question: When Jesus said to love God with all your heart, soul, and mind, and love your neighbor as yourself... "What if He meant that we should love our <u>actual</u> neighbors?"

It's a good question, and it's one that we really began tackling last month when we talked about the importance of *Listening*. Listening is vital part of relationship building, and it often opens the door for ongoing communication. If we're going to be serious about reaching out to and demonstrating Christ's love for our neighbors (especially those who quite literally live next door), then we need to get to know them by listening to what matters most to them. As I often share with couples preparing for marriage, any good relationship includes effective listening skills; and it's the topic of listening that leads into our focus for this month – *Understanding*.

Understanding is yet another essential building block when it comes to developing the kind of relationship that leads to effective outreach and evangelism; and because understanding is directly connected to listening, it is vital that we look for clarification through active listening skills when in conversation with someone else. To do this, practicing active listening skills is vital. For instance, asking a person what they mean when they say something you don't quite understand, or simply asking them to elaborate, are simple ways to grow a deeper understanding of someone else's values and what's really going on in their life. This also allows us to highlight points of connection (things that we can relate to and talk about), and it opens more doors that help set the stage for them to share their story.

And that's exactly what we want. Asking a person to share their story is essentially asking them to open up and allow you into their world....which is why this is something that should never be rushed. The best relationships are often forged over time, so in order to get to this point, you should plan on investing exactly that -- time. Whether it's through ongoing conversations over the fence, neighborhood activities (which I believe we need more of), or while helping them out around the yard...plan to invest time in order to learn more about them and where they're coming from. And, as you do, look for moments when they begin to invite you to share your story. This provides a more authentic approach, which is one of the best ways to witness – authentically.

Over the years I've grown to understand something about the people I consider to be my closest friends. First, I can say that these friendships didn't develop overnight. They took time. Second, these are people who now know things about me that most never will...which means there's a certain amount of vulnerability in our relationship -- vulnerability that is connected to trust. If we are going to be serious about outreach and effective witnessing, then we need to understand that the relationships we seek are those that allow others to open up, share their story, and allow themselves to become vulnerable. When the time is right, they will allow you the opportunity to do the same as you share the story that you are already living. And, oh, what an amazing story you have to share; because your story isn't just about telling others of Jesus's story. Jesus' story is your story!

God's blessings to you as you seek to build those relationships!

Ashes Already?

While it seems like we just celebrated the birth of our Lord, Ash Wednesday is right around the corner. With the season of Lent set to have an early start this year, *Ash Wednesday will take place on Wednesday, February 14.* That's right. This year, we begin the Lenten season by humbling ourselves on the same day that our culture focuses on the theme of Love.

It makes sense when we stop to think about what Ash Wednesday is all about. The central event of the Christian faith is the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. That's why it was the center of the apostles' preaching, and it remains the center and theme of our liturgy and worship every Sunday. The season of Lent prepares us to remember and observe the greatest event in human history and the ultimate act of God's great love for us; which is why Holy Week proclaims the death of Jesus on Good Friday and celebrates His resurrection on Easter Sunday. No doubt, Ash Wednesday not only begins the season of Lent, but it is a day of vital importance for Christians.

Ash Wednesday also reminds us of our mortality with those words: "Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return." (Genesis 3:19) These words were spoken to our first parents in the Garden of Eden due to their fall into sin, and God's people have continued their reflection on those words by putting them into practice.

Throughout history, people placed ashes on their heads and wore sackcloth. In fact, within the Bible, (see Genesis 18, Numbers 19, Esther 4, Job 2 & 4, and Daniel 9) we find that ashes were used as a sign of mourning and penitence. They were also used as a purifying symbol of an unworthy people; and even Jesus speaks of the use of ashes for repentance in Matthew 11:21. As you can see, this has direct connections to the ancient church's practice of using the imposition of ashes as a sign of repentance.

Today, Christian's remember that they are dust by placing (or imposing) ashes on their foreheads. But the ashes are imposed as crosses to remind us that, yes, we are dust, and to dust we shall return; however through Christ's death and resurrection, God has turned our mourning into joy. In fact, in Baptism (where the cross is also imposed upon us), we have been united with Christ's great victory. Therefore, we look beyond the grave – reminded that, because of the Cross of Jesus and the empty tomb of Easter, we live with the sure and certain hope that, in His great love and mercy for us, God has raised us from the ashes of our sin and brokenness once and for all.

Make sure to *join us on Wednesday, February 14, at 3:30 p.m. or 7:00 p.m. for our Ash Wednesday* **services**. If you are unable to attend in the evening, please note that you can also join our students in chapel at 8:15 a.m. where we plan to include the Imposition of Ashes, as well.

A Walk through the Service: Part 1

Greetings in Christ!

Often in life, we might ask ourselves questions about why we do things a particular way. This may apply to family traditions or to our personal or work habits. One of the biggest questions we might hear in the church is about why we worship in the pattern that we do. For the next two months, I'll be sharing some background for and walking through the traditional Lutheran service, which we often refer to in the LCMS as the "Divine Service," or in the German, "Gottesdienst." In other traditions, it can be known as the "Mass."

One of the clearest ways we abide in God's Word from week to week is when we speak and sing in the Divine Service. Worship is very clearly at the heart and center of the activity of the Christian Church, as shown in Acts 2:42, "They devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and to fellowship, to the breaking of bread and to prayer." The form of the Divine Service has changed over time as things are added or removed and as styles change, but the basic order of the service has been used by the universal Church for the last 2,000 years. Further from there, its roots go back to Old Testament practices!

The introduction to a previous LCMS hymnal has this to say: "Our Lord speaks and we listen. His Word bestows what it says. When we say back to Him what He has said to us, we repeat what is most true and sure. The rhythm of our worship is from Him to us, and then from us back to Him. He gives His gifts, and together we receive and extol them. We build one another up as we speak to one another in psalms, hymns and spiritual songs. The Lord gives us His body to eat and His blood to drink. His blessing moves us out into our calling, where His gifts have their fruition."

This is a beautiful picture of what the Divine Service is: it is *divine* because of God's action. We do not come to worship to give, but to receive. God serves us with His gifts of Word and Sacrament. We receive these gifts and then we offer our thanksgiving and praise! It is only fitting then, that the words we speak in the service are actually a narrative of salvation. The order of the service is a web of words from Scripture and actions that relate to each other. This form has served for so long because it so wonderfully communicates the Good News to us and delivers God's gifts to us. While those of us who grew up speaking and singing the service might think it to be too routine, another way to look at it is this: from year to year, in our hearing, speaking and singing, we are rehearsing for our lives and for eternity. We do not speak these words only to ourselves, but to each other.

Robert W. Costa Director Of Modern Worship To begin our walk through the service, this month we will start at the beginning and go through Confession and Absolution.

Pre-Service Music (1 Samuel 16:23): As we enter the Sanctuary during the pre-service music, this is a good time to personally prepare for worship and to pray. Sample prayers for before worship may be found in the inside front cover of our hymnal, *Lutheran Service Book*.

Invocation (Matthew 18:20, 28:19; Colossians 3:17): The Service begins after the Opening Hymn with the name of God. Invoking His name makes it clear that worship is His service to us, not ours to Him. We also are reminded that we are baptized into His name which was placed upon us through water and the Word. The sign of the cross, which was placed on our head and our heart in Baptism, reminds us that we belong to Christ.

Confession and Absolution (1 John 1:8-9, Psalm 51, Matthew 16:19): As we approach God, we are reminded that we are beggars in need of forgiveness of our sins. When we confess our sins, we acknowledge that we are unworthy to come before God, and that He must instead come to us. In the Absolution, God, through the mouth of His servant, the Pastor, declares us forgiven because of the salvation won for us by Christ upon the cross. Every sin is covered by Him.

May the Lord be with you and grant you His peace this new month!

I think I have restarted this article about 17 times already. Every time I would start to write, I would just erase it because I didn't like what I wrote. It didn't sound right. The words were all wrong. Who am I kidding, no one will probably read it anyways. I don't have anything that important to say... Then it hit me! This DOUBT and NEGATIVE TALK in my head is another weapon the devil uses against us.

Doubt can snowball into so many areas of our life and can ultimately affect our relationship with God. Jesus knows about doubt, He saw first hand what doubt can do. Think about Peter in the storm in Matthew 14. Peter got out of the boat during a fierce storm and walked on water towards Jesus. "But when he saw the wind, he was afraid and, beginning



to sink, cried out, 'Lord, save me!'" (Matt. 14:30 - NIV). When Peter stepped out of the boat, he had faith that Christ would protect him.

Each morning that we wake up, we are stepping out of the boat to join Jesus in the mission field of our daily lives. But then the devil kicks up the winds of self-doubt and negative talk that cause us to be afraid of what the world thinks. But just like Peter, Christ is there to reach out His hand and catch us from sinking into the waves of negativity and doubt. And when He calms the wind and the waves, we can boldly say that "Truly (He is) the Son of God" (Matt. 14:33b) by living our faith, Inside Out!

February Focus: Fetal Development

The Life Team of St. Peter Lutheran Church in Macomb, MI exists to educate, encourage, and empower the members of our congregation to be gospel-motivated voices for life. This is our mission statement and defines how we encourage our members to approach life issues. The focus of this month's article is fetal development.

"For you created my inmost being; you knit me together in my mother's womb. I praise you because I am fearfully and wonderfully made; your works are wonderful, I know that full well. My frame was not hidden from you when I was made in the secret place. When I was woven together in the depths of the earth, your eyes saw my unformed body. All the days ordained for me were written in your book before one of them came to be." Psalms 139:13-16

God's word points us to the fact that the process of fetal development is an intricate one- "you knit me together in my mother's womb." Although I have never knitted, my crafty daughter has tried to teach me to crochet before and I can attest to the fact that is it quite complicated. Thanks to modern technology, including 3d and 4d ultrasounds, we have gained much insight into the incredible development process that a child undergoes within their mother as a result of God's intelligent design. Here are just a few of the major milestones in that process:

- Immediately upon conception, cellular development begins. Even before implantation, the genetic identity is complete, including sex, hair color, etc.
- At 18-22 days, the child's heartbeat begins.
- At 22-28 days, the eyes, ears, spine, arm buds, kidney, liver, and umbilical cord start to form.
- At 36-42 days, brain waves are measurable. The eyelids, fingers, and joints are all forming. The baby may experience hiccups and makes slow body movements.
- At 56 days (eight weeks), the name of the new life is changed from embryo to fetus. All organs are
 functioning-stomach, liver, kidney, brain-and all systems are intact. There are lines in the palms. All future
 development of the new life is simply that of refinement and increase in size.
- At 10 weeks, the child squints, opens mouth, and moves fingers and toes. External genitalia are now visible. The child's bones harden, and body hair develops.
- At 16 weeks (four months), the baby grasps with its hands, swims, kicks, turns somersaults, swallows, and sleeps.
- At 18 weeks, the child's vocal cords are working and the baby can cry.
- At 20 weeks, eyebrows and fingernails are complete and the child has fingerprints.
- At 21 weeks, if born, the child could possibly survive and at 24 weeks, the survival rate is 60-70 percent.

Do you want to learn more? The Creation Museum in Petersburg, KY has an exhibit called "Fearfully & Wonderfully Made." It features intricate lifelike models, a detailed developmental timeline, as well as biblical and scientific teaching. Here is a description of the exhibit from their website: "The Bible informs us that every human being from the moment of fertilization is made in God's image, both male and female. This is true regardless of one's level of development, physical or mental ability, ethnicity, or age. Although issues regarding life in the womb are hotly contested in our world, the matter is settled by the ultimate authority: the very words of our Creator. The Fearfully & Wonderfully Made exhibit calls attention to the biblical and scientific truths about the unborn while pointing guests to the hope and forgiveness that can only be found in the gospel of Jesus Christ."

HISTORY CORNER



It is important to remember that St. Peter History is not meant to show how great St. Peter is, but how amazing God is as He works through His Word and Sacraments among us. History is His story. Our History is a Ministry that proclaims His great deeds to future generations.

THE LENTEN WREATH

The Lenten Wreath is made of Birchwood, in the shape of a hexagon, symbolizing the six weeks of Lent, with a candle at each corner. Lent is a season of repentance. The five violet candles symbolize the scarlet of our sins and our need for repentance. "Though your sins be as scarlet, they shall be as white as snow...." (Is. I:18). "Repent ye, therefore, and be converted, that your sins may be blotted out" (Acts 3:19). The black candle pictures the blackness of sin resulting in death. "The wages of sin is death." (Rom. 6:23). The lighted candles are a symbol of Christ as the "Light of the World." (John 8:212)



All the candles will be lit for all services through the first week in Lent (through the Wednesday following Ash Wednesday). Beginning with the second week in Lent, only five candles will be lit, the third week only four, and so on until on Good Friday only the black candle is lit. At the close of the Good Friday service, this black candle will be extinguished, signifying the death of Jesus Christ.

On Easter Sunday, and during the Easter Season, all the candles will be replaced by white candles and all will be lit. The white symbolizes the "white as snow" (Is. 1:18) purity that sinful men find through faith in Christ who died for them and rose again, and lives forevermore.

The symbols on the six sides (between the candles) also have deep religious significance. Two crosses adorn the wreath; remind us that on His cross, Jesus gave His life as a ransom for our sins. "The Son of Man came...to give His Life as a ransom for many" (Mark 10:45). The cross over the world shows that He is the Savior of all people, so that "whosoever believes in Him should not perish, but have everlasting life" (John 3:16). The cross with three nails reminds us that He was fastened to the cross with nails. The fourth nail which is invisible really held Him there. That invisible nail is the nail of His love. The crowing rooster reminds us that He was denied by a confessor (Peter). The moneybag with thirty pieces of silver indicates that He was betrayed by a friend (Judas). The chi Rho symbol (which looks like an X and a P in our alphabet) are the first two letters in Greek for Christ. The fish is a symbol used by the early Christians to identify themselves to one another as followers of Christ. The Greek word for fish is IXOYE (ICHTHUS). The initial letters for the phrase, "Jesus Christ, Son of God, Savior" in Greek spell the word ICHTHUS (fish).
