Neighboring 101

(Witnessing Series - Part III)

"But in your hearts set apart Christ as Lord. Always be prepared to give an answer to everyone who asks you to give the reason for the hope that you have. But do this with gentleness and respect..."

1 Peter 3:15

As we conclude our three-part series on sharing Christ in the Post-Modern world, I think it goes without saying that we've been given a very powerful story to tell...and, as God's children who have been written into *THE* greatest story history will ever know, we have every reason to be bold and excited to share it. Why? Because Jesus' story *IS* our story! However, as we prepare to share it, it would do all of us well to recall the following:

- 1. Don't forget to listen to those you are connecting with. Listening leads to understanding; and it's vital to hear and understand their story.
- 2. Don't jump the gun when it comes to sharing your story. Too often, we want to rush right into who we are albeit with good intention; but more often than not, if an invitation to share our story has not been extended and a door has not been opened, we will be talking to exactly that a closed door.
- 3. Watch and listen for invitations to share your story. Invitations can range from questions like "What do you think?" or there may be more subtle hints that come up over time. The key is to grow a relationship that leads to understanding what the person is saying. This will then lead to a better understanding of when doors are being opened and invitations to hear your story are being extended.

Again, it's vital to remember that it often takes time to get to this point in a relationship. Certainly, there are times when we have an opportunity to share our story on the spot; but as you may already understand, this usually takes time because relationships take time. When the opportunity to finally share your story arrives, though, it's always good to be ready. So…here are some "Story Sharing Guidelines" that can help you prepare.

- 1. **Pray!** Ask the Holy Spirit to guide you and prepare you to be a bold witness. After all, He's the One who opens doors, and He's the One who can and will see to it that His Word does not return void.
- 2. **Avoid being long-winded.** When sharing your story, get to the point. (Why are you a believer? What happened that caused an eternal change in your life?) Don't oversupply or overload with information. The person you're talking to can always ask questions.
- 3. **Be authentic.** Most people can sense whether someone is overdramatizing the story and they can often see when a person is not being a straight-shooter.
- 4. **Be clear.** Be specific, especially if your story includes events that were life changing. Clarity is important. (What were you like beforehand? What happened? And who are you now?)

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- 5. **Avoid an attitude of superiority.** Let's get right to it on this one. No one likes to be talked down to. A good rule of thumb is to avoid talking as if you are somehow wiser or better than the other person.
- 6. **Avoid overusing religious terminology.** Tell your story in terms that people understand. For example, being "sanctified by the Holy Spirit" is a great thing...unless the other person has no idea who the Holy Spirit is and what the word "sanctified" means.
- 7. **Avoid "weird" God stories.** Don't get me wrong. I'm not defining the variety of ways God works in our lives as weird; but to someone who has no faith, those things are going to sound a little "far out" and cause them to pull back and withdraw. These things can be saved for later.
- 8. **Last...write your faith story.** We ask our confirmands to do it, so why shouldn't we? I'm a firm believer that writing out your story will allow you to zero in on what it is that you want to say. Once again, you can always elaborate if and when the person asks questions, but this allows you to really focus on what it is that you are conveying.

A story can be a very powerful thing. That's why bookstores look for stories that are apt to become bestsellers. They know that a powerful story is a great story...especially if it's based on true events.

That's why we look for opportunities to tell our story. There is no story more powerful than one that reveals the love God has for each and every one of us in Christ Jesus – a love that is so great that He would be willing to do what it takes to rewrite the ending for all us. After all, can you imagine what our story would have been without Jesus life, death, and resurrection? Yes...our story *IS* Jesus' story, and it's been rewritten to include a living hope that goes beyond the reach of time. May the Holy Spirit lead you to share the new story that you have been given by Jesus to live now and into eternity...so that others may have the same.

A blessed Easter to all of you as you live out your Alleluias. Christ is risen! He is risen indeed!

A Walk through the Service: Part 2

Greetings in Christ!

This month, we will be continuing our walk through the Divine Service. Why continue to do so? As I shared last month, our speaking and singing the service is one of the clearest ways we abide in God's Word throughout our lives. Every time we gather to receive God's gifts of Word and Sacrament in the service, heaven truly comes to us!

Having ended last month's article with Confession & Absolution, we continue in the service knowing that as we hear and receive God's Word and Sacrament, we have been marked as God's own children through Baptism and declared forgiven.

Kyrie (Matthew 15:22; Mark 10:46-47) – Coming before the Lord and having confessed our sins and being declared forgiven, we prepare for the reading of God's Word. In the words of the Kyrie ("Lord, have mercy"), we pray as a congregation that the Lord would hear us and help us in our troubles and needs.

Hymn of Praise (Luke 2:14; John 1:29; Revelation 5:11-14, 19:5-9) – Confidently knowing that God is gracious and merciful, we sing the Hymn of Praise, either the traditional Gloria in Excelsis or "This is the Feast." The Gloria in Excelsis, the hymn of the angels sung in Luke 2, is a song that invites us to come and see our Lord Jesus in the readings from Holy Scripture.

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Robert's Music Spotlight

This month I wanted to share with you the song "No Body" by Elevation Worship. As we prepare our hearts this Lenten season, this song is a brilliant encapsulation of what Jesus did for us. This song declares that the fullness of God can't be kept in a grave, and because there is "no body" in the grave, we have access to victory through Christ and Christ alone. Christ defeated death and the grave, took the keys right from the gates of hell, all because He loved you that much. (Revelation 1:17-18) Let's celebrate this Easter that, because there is no body in the grave, nobody has to stay in a grave of their sin separated from eternity with Him. (Colossians 2:12, 1 Corinthians 15:1-4 and 15:20-23)

"This is the Feast," which quotes Revelation 5 and 19, is a hymn that praises the crucified and risen Christ, the Lamb Who is worthy of praise.

Salutation and Collect of the Day (2 Timothy 4:22; Ruth 2:4; Jude 25) – The Salutation ("The Lord be with you" "And with your spirit") is a loving greeting between the Pastor and the congregation, and helps us to know that the Lord will make Himself known to us in His Word which will soon be heard. The Collect of the Day is a prayer that makes a request of God, and is usually based on the appointed Gospel reading for the day. Many of these prayers have been used for more than 1,500 years, uniting us with generations of old and those to come. At the conclusion of the prayer, the congregation affirms what is said with "Amen" ("yes, yes, it shall be so").

Old Testament Reading (Luke 4:17-21) – Typically, the first reading comes from the Old Testament. The Old Testament prepares us to hear the Holy Gospel, which fulfills the prophecies and promises made in the Old Testament.

Epistle (Acts 2:42) – The Epistles are letters of the early church Apostles, which demonstrate how God's Word is applied to us and the Church at large. In the Epistle, we are reminded that God's Word accomplishes what it says.

Alleluia and Verse (John 6:68, 20:31) – Alleluia is Hebrew for "praise the Lord," and is a word we sing as we prepare to hear of the life, death and resurrection of Christ.

Holy Gospel (John 6:63, 20:30-31) – The reading of the Gospel contains the life and teachings of Jesus Christ. It commonly forms the basis for the theme of the day and is tied to the other readings, prayers and sermon which are specific to the day.

Sermon Hymn and other hymns (Colossians 3:16; Psalm 78:4) – God encourages us to sing our prayers, praise and thanksgiving through His Word. In hymns, we respond to His Word by proclaiming again His marvelous works and giving thanks. Hymns allow us to join together in proclaiming the Word which is likewise read and preached. The Sermon Hymn in particular teaches again the theme of the day by placing it upon our lips.

Creed (1 Timothy 6:12; Matthew 10:32-33) – Upon hearing the Word, we respond by uniting our voices in a summary of the Christian faith. When we speak one of the historic creeds (Apostles', Nicene, Athanasian) we express unity of faith with one another and the Church throughout the ages.

Sermon (2 Timothy 4:1-2; 1 Corinthians 1:23) – Christ sent the apostles into the world to preach the Word. This Word is proclaimed in the Sermon, the pastor's proclamation which is usually based on the Scripture readings for the day. In the Sermon the Pastor speaks God's words of judgment (Law) and grace (Gospel).

Next month, we will continue with the Offering and Offertory followed by the Service of the Sacrament. May God grant us a blessed Lent as we reflect on our baptismal faith and life, recall and take to heart the sacrifice Christ gave for us, and as we prepare for a full and jubilant celebration of the Resurrection!

THE MEANING OF THE WIDOW'S MITE

During the time of Herod, mites were the smallest denomination coin in Judea. The term "Widow's mite" is based on Luke 21:1-4.

As Jesus looked up, he saw the rich putting their gifts into the temple treasury. He also saw a poor widow put in two very small copper coins. "Truly I tell you" He said, "this poor widow has put in more than all the others. All these people gave their gifts out of their wealth, but she out of her poverty put in all she had to live on."

As the Bible reminds us, even small offerings can make an enormous impact. The Mite Box is intended for regular contributions of "mites"—offerings above and beyond the support given to congregations and LCMS. Combined, these amount to millions of dollars for funding mission grants and providing ongoing support for various other Lutheran Women in Mission programs.

Excerpts from: "Lessons From Will, The Doctor With Down Syndrome"

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If there was one vastly underestimated resident at The Manor, it was Will, the doctor with Down syndrome. I first met Dr. Will when I was thirteen. Occasionally, I would accompany my mother to The Manor, where he lived. There, I would be given a volunteer vest and either sent down the women's wing with an ice bucket and scoop or stationed in the kitchen to help serve lunch.

My mother became the administrator of The Manor, an assisted living center, after having spent much of her time working for Kentucky's famous Western State Hospital. At my elementary school, playground gossip revealed that Western State was a haunted asylum for the criminally insane. Depending on which 9-year-old you asked, my mother was either "crazy" or "ultra-cool" for working there. Despite all the 3rd-grade street cred I received from having an "ultra-cool" mom, my first perceptions of adults with special needs were that they were society's abnormalities. Sadly, I was led to the same misconceptions as most people who are unfamiliar with the special needs community:

They are abnormal, unpredictable, tragic, and even dangerous. **Thankfully, Will was there to show me how wrong I was.**

Fortunately for me, years later, my mother took a new position at The Manor, where I was introduced to new stories, first-hand. These stories, and the people I experienced, washed away all the skepticism and fear I previously had concerning those with special needs.

My favorite patient was one who wandered the halls of The Manor in a crisp white lab coat, scrubs, and a nametag that read *Dr. Will.* Before Will, I had never met an adult with Down syndrome. This wasn't an unusual thing, given that the life expectancy for those with Down syndrome, at the time, was only 47 years. Despite having multiple health issues related to having Down syndrome, Dr. Will was approaching his fifties with an abundance of energy and joy.

What I recall of Dr. Will was that he was always smiling, hugging people, and telling them he loved him. He was also good at making my mother laugh. When volunteers and visitors arrived at the Manor, Will was the first to greet them; he was the one to hug them goodbye and tell them they were loved. When they returned, he knew them, right away.

Maybe Dr. Will didn't have an MD, but he had patients, those who came into The Manor with hearts that needed healing from their misconceptions about those with special needs. By witnessing Dr. Will at work, many people learned that the guidelines for understanding and interacting with those with special needs are simple:

They are human, just like you and me. They have feelings, fears, hopes, and dreams. They desire and deserve patience, love, and community just as much as any other person in the world. They have impact and when we reject them from our lives, we are left misguided and incomplete.

Recently, I learned that, in the United States, around 67% of children with Down syndrome are aborted. **In some countries, every child with Down syndrome is aborted.** That means that, in some places, every single Dr. Will is denied the right to life, and millions of people are deprived of his love.

The reasons for this response to the diagnose are seemingly compassionate, but definitely misguided:

They'll never have the same quality of life as a "normal" person.

They'll never be able to live on their own.

There aren't enough resources to provide them with proper care.

As demonstrated by the work of Dr. Will, the biggest hurdle that the special needs community is forced to face is fear; more specifically, our fear of them. The fear that we, or others, won't accept them. The fear that they can't handle the struggles that will be presented to them in their everyday lives.

The truth is, if we choose to live in open-minded hope, rather than in fear of what we don't understand, we bring healing and growth to ourselves and others, just as Dr. Will did throughout his life.

HISTORY CORNER



It is important to remember that St. Peter History is not meant to show how great St. Peter is, but how amazing God is as He works through His Word and Sacraments among us. History is His story. Our History is a Ministry that proclaims His great deeds to future generations.

For this Easter season, we reprint a note from Pastor Knoll that was first printed in the Across the Miles newsletter of April, 3, 1944. This newsletter was sent to all St. Peter servicemen during WWII by the Walther League, our teenager and young adults' group. The Walther League was the first established group at St. Peter in 1925 and was instrumental in raising funds for our church needs and many charitable organizations. Some members of the WWII era Walther League and WWII soldiers are still with us! Thank you to all of them. Our youth group continues to this day and our service men and women are served by our Military Ministry.

Pastor Knoll's Easter message of 1944:

Christianity bases its hope and faith on one single fact, the greatest miracle of the ages, Christ's resurrection. If it is true that Christ rose, then all other facts of Scripture are true. If Christ is not risen, then the other facts matter very little. The fact that Christ rose is unique and distinctive of Christianity. Our Christian religion stands only if Christ rose from the dead.

This is Paul's argument when he tells us: "If Christ be not risen, then is our preaching vain, and your faith is also vain."

If Christ is not risen, then we have no Gospel. Then Paul was, and all those who preach this Gospel today are, false witnesses, telling lies. But do you think that Paul would have fought the lions at Ephesus if he had not believed that Christ had risen from the grave and that therefore his own resurrection to life everlasting was assured? If Christ had not risen, then certainly he would have been a fool to endure so many hardships and persecutions and even to suffer a martyr's death.

If Christ is not risen, our faith is vain, that glorious faith which assures us of the forgiveness of all our sins. Sin is real and sin spells disaster. Sin sends us into the depths of hell. If Christ is not risen, then this sin problem is still ours; for then our sins are unforgiven and we are eternally lost.

Truly, the outlook would be dismal and dark and gloomy. However, Paul makes the triumphant assertion: "But now is Christ risen from the dead." That fills every believer with joy and gives him the blessed assurance that his sin is forgiven and that he shall live eternally.

That this Easter joy may be and remain yours, is the ardent prayer and wish of
