Stand Up!

Have you noticed how something new can jump out at you when reading the Bible. That happened to me in an early morning men's Bible Study several years back. We were going through the Book of Acts and, that morning, we were in the 7th chapter reading through the account of the stoning of Stephen.

Now, I've read through this particular section of the Bible a number of times over the years but, as we were reading, one word suddenly grabbed by attention – the word "*standing*."

"When they heard this, they were furious and gnashed their teeth at him. But Stephen, full of the Holy Spirit, looked up to heaven and saw the glory of God, and Jesus <u>standing</u> at the right hand of God. 'Look,' he said, 'I see heaven open and the Son of Man <u>standing</u> at the right hand of God."

Acts 7:54-56

Like I said, I've read this description of Stephen's last moments here on earth many times before, but this was the first time that I noticed that, tucked away in this passage, is the fact that Jesus is **standing** at the right hand of God.

I think it threw me off because we're so used to reading, hearing, and saying that the Lord is now <u>seated</u> at the right hand of God...which is often the way Scripture speaks. The risen and ascended Lord Jesus is usually depicted as being <u>seated</u> in the position of authority, power, and might; and, yet, in this passage Stephen sees our ascended Lord <u>standing</u>...which brought to mind a question: "Why, at this moment, did Stephen see the Lord <u>standing</u> and not seated as we often read?" Nowhere else in the New Testament do we hear of Jesus standing at the right hand of God.

It's an interesting picture, isn't it? Jesus rising up from His rightful seat just before His servant, Stephen, breathes his last breath here on earth. But...why? Why is Jesus standing?

There are varying opinions when it comes to this question. Some believe that the description of Jesus **standing** has no significant meaning and that this was simply another way of wording things. Others have suggested that Stephen sees the Lord **standing** because Jesus had not yet been seated on the heavenly throne. Still...others (like me) suggest that there's more going on than we realize.

Could it be that the Lord was getting up from His seat in order to meet Stephen with open and outstretched arms? Or could Jesus have been standing as a witness – offering testimony on behalf of Stephen. As one commentator wrote: "Stephen has been confessing Christ before men, and now he sees Christ confessing His servant before God." (F.F. Bruce) Makes sense, since witnesses of any kind would stand, not sit.

These possibilities are all legitimate and worthy of discussion, and there's no doubt that this would be a great topic for further study. That being said...what I can tell you for certain is this: While the real reason Stephen sees Jesus <u>standing</u> is not made completely clear, I do know that it was on Tuesday, May 23, 2006, at approximately 7:00 a.m. that (after all these years) I saw the risen and ascended Lord Jesus <u>standing</u> in this passage for the first time in my life; and, because of this, I'm all the more assured that I, along with you, will once again see Him <u>standing</u> when we enter Paradise.

In the meantime, I think it's only right and fitting for all of us to stand up as His children. As those who have been baptized into the same Triune God who has revealed Himself to us in the same Jesus Christ who lived, died, rose, and ascended to His rightful throne for us...it's time to once again stand up and testify to Who it is that truly reigns on His heavenly throne. **Stand up for Jesus**...until that time when we see Him at His throne and fall to our knees in worship and praise.


All glory, honor, and praise be to our risen Savior, Jesus – the King of kings and Lord of lords!

A Walk through the Service: Part 3

Greetings in Christ and Happy Easter!

This month, we will be concluding our walk through the Divine Service. Why spend three months of Keynotes articles doing so? As I shared the last few months, our speaking and singing the Service is one of the clearest ways we abide in God's Word throughout our lives. Every time we gather to receive God's gifts of Word and Sacrament in the Service, heaven comes to us! Having ended last month's article with the Sermon, we continue towards the Service of the Sacrament.

Offering and Offertory (Psalm 116:12-14, 17, 19) – We have freely received and now freely give! Just as we respond to God's Word with thanksgiving, we now may respond by returning to the Lord a portion of what we have. As the offering is brought forward, we sing the Offertory, which is another sacrifice (offering) of praise.

Prayer of the Church (1 Timothy 2:1-6; James 5:16) – As God's children, it is our responsibility to pray for ourselves, for one another and for the world.

Service of the Sacrament – This is the celebration of Holy Communion, which was instituted by Christ. In the Lord's Supper, those who are instructed in the faith come to the altar to receive Christ's very body and blood in, with and under the visible elements of wine and bread. In this Supper we are united with Christ and are given His forgiveness, life and salvation. We are likewise united with Christians throughout the world and the saints in heaven.

Preface and Proper Preface (2 Timothy 4:22; Psalm 136) – This is an ancient dialogue between the Pastor and congregation, first recorded in A.D. 220. At the close of the Proper Preface, the Pastor says "Therefore with angels and archangels and with all the company of heaven. . .," which reminds us that when we worship we also join with the angels and saints in heaven in their continuing worship of the Lamb.

Robert's Music Spotlight This month I wanted to share with you the song, "Another One" by Elevation

Worship. I know that I have shared quite a few songs from Elevation Worship as of late, but as a worship team, they have been writing and releasing very timely corporate worship songs. This latest release walks through many tenants of our faith while reminding us that Jesus is not done working miracles in our everyday lives. (Philippians 1:6) The bridge of this song speaks of the many miracles God has performed, from creation to an empty grave, while also making a



declaration of faith that another miracle is on the way. While the miracle of what Christ did through His death, burial, and resurrection is already enough, I truly believe that He is our provider and working right now. Not only can He work in whatever you may be facing right now, we also have the added promise that, one day, He is coming to save those who are eagerly waiting for Him. (Hebrews 9:28) Having just celebrated Easter, I encourage you to stand strong in your faith, knowing that another miracle is on the way! Amen!

Sanctus ("Holy, Holy") (Isaiah 6:3; Matthew 21:9) – "Sanctus" means "holy." We use these words from Isaiah 6 to proclaim that heaven has come to earth, that the division between the two is gone, and that all participate in the heavenly chorus. Singing "hosanna in the highest," we also worship Christ who comes to us in the Lord's Supper.

Lord's Prayer (Matthew 6:9-13) – The Lord's Prayer was given to us to pray by Jesus Himself. As His children, we call upon Him as we prepare to encounter Him in His Supper.

Words of Institution (Matthew 26:26-28; 1 Corinthians 11:23-25) – The Pastor speaks these words to consecrate, or set apart the bread and wine. God's Word accomplishes here exactly what it says, which is that Christ delivers His true body and blood for our forgiveness.

Pax Domini (The Peace) (John 20:19-21) – Just as Christ said to the disciples on the first Easter, the Pastor speaks on His behalf "The peace of the Lord be with you always." The peace that passes all understanding is here present in the body and blood of Christ for our benefit.

Agnus Dei (Lamb of God) (John 1:29) – In the presence of Christ, we sing "Lamb of God." Using the words of John the Baptist, we cry out and sing the praise of the Lamb who has washed us clean.

Post-Communion Canticle (Luke 2:29-32; Psalm 118) – After the distribution of the Sacrament, we sing the Nunc Dimittis, the song which Simeon sang in thanksgiving for having seen the Lord before he died, as recorded in Luke 2. Having received and seen Christ in the Sacrament, we join Simeon in this song. In the other option, "Thank the Lord," we give thanks to God for strengthening us through the gift of His body and blood.

Post-Communion Collect (Psalm 118; Psalm 136) – Having received God's gifts, we thank Him and ask that these gifts would strengthen us in body and soul and carry us into our lives as we take up our vocations anew.

Benediction (Numbers 6:22-27) – In Numbers 6, God gave Aaron His name to use as a blessing. Just as we began the service with God's name, we depart in His name, fed and nourished, and with His peace.

Almighty God, grant to Your Church Your Holy Spirit and the wisdom that comes down from above, that Your Word may not be bound but have free course and be preached to the joy and edifying of Christ's holy people, that in steadfast faith we may serve You and, in the confession of Your name, abide unto the end; through Jesus Christ, our Lord.



in 107 different schools across 13 states and internationally in Hanoi, Vietnam.

At St. Peter Macomb, three teachers provide direct teaching in areas of math, spelling, reading, and written language. We also manage the plans of students who are best served in the classroom full-time, but with some accommodations to help them be successful. Additionally, we act as liaisons with Utica Community Schools to help facilitate testing of students who may need a referral for special education. In addition, our Book Bunch program provides students in grades K-3 with extra support in reading. This year, we service over 70 students in one way or another, grades K-8.

HISTORY CORNER



It is important to remember that St. Peter History is not meant to show how great St. Peter is, but how amazing God is as He works through His Word and Sacraments among us. History is His story. Our History is a Ministry that proclaims His great deeds to future generations.

For this Easter season we reprint a note from Pastor Knoll that was first printed in the *Across the Miles* newsletter of April, 3, 1944. This newsletter was sent to all St. Peter servicemen during WW II by the Walther League, our teenager and young adults' group. The Walther League was the first established group at St. Peter in 1925 and was instrumental in raising funds for our church needs and many charitable organizations. Some members of the WW II era Walther League and WW II soldiers are still with us! Thank you to all of them. Our Youth Group continues to this day and our service men and women are served by our Military Ministry.

Pastor Knoll's Easter message of 1944:

Christianity bases its hope and faith on one single fact, the greatest miracle of the ages, Christ's resurrection. If it is true that Christ rose, then all other facts of Scripture are true. If Christ is not risen, then the other facts matter very little. The fact that Christ rose is unique and distinctive of Christianity. Our Christian religion stands only if Christ rose from the dead.

This is Paul's argument when he tells us: "If Christ be not risen, then is our preaching vain, and your faith is also vain."

If Christ is not risen, then we have no Gospel. Then Paul was, and all those who preach this Gospel today are, false witnesses, telling lies. But do you think that Paul would have fought the lions at Ephesus if he had not believed that Christ had risen from the grave and that therefore his own resurrection to life everlasting was assured? If Christ had not risen, then certainly he would have been a fool to endure so many hardships and persecutions and even to suffer a martyr's death.

If Christ is not risen, our faith is vain, that glorious faith which assures us of the forgiveness of all our sins. Sin is real and sin spells disaster. Sin sends us into the depths of hell. If Christ is not risen, then this sin problem is still ours; for then our sins are unforgiven and we are eternally lost.

Truly, the outlook would be dismal and dark and gloomy. However, Paul makes the triumphant assertion: "But now <u>is</u> Christ risen from the dead." That fills every believer with joy and gives him the blessed assurance that his sin is forgiven and that he shall live eternally.

That this Easter joy may be and remain yours, is the ardent prayer and wish of
