Regents extend Dr. Harris' contract

Northern Oklahoma College President Dr. 2022 enrollment increased from Summer 2021. food service Clark Harris' contract was extended Wednesday at the June Board of Regents' meeting in Tonkawa.

Dr. Harris came to NOC in July 2021.

"My first year at Northern has been a tremendous experience," Dr. Harris said. "The faculty and staff at Northern have a strong commitment for helping our students achieve success. Northern Oklahoma College has a bright future and it is wonderful as we work together as we build a better NOC."

The regents also elected officers for the 2022-23 fiscal year. Jami Groendyke, Enid, will be the chairperson while Brad Fox, Ponca City, will be the Vice-Chair. Jason Turnbow, Enid, will be the secretary while Jodi Cline, Ponca City, and Michael Martin, Stillwater, are members on the board.

In administrator updates, Vice President for Community Relations & Development reported \$274,000 in recent donations to the Northern Oklahoma College Foundation. Those donations include a \$200,000 donation to the Vinevard Library project.

Vice President for Enid Jeremy Hise reported a \$146,000 NASA grant on the Enid campus for astronomy research.

Dr. Rick Edgington, Vice President for Enrollment Management, reported that Summer

Dr. Edgington also said he is cautiously optimistic for Fall 2022 enrollment due to targeted August 2022. enrollment ongoing this summer at NOC.

Vice President for Academic Affairs Diana Watkins reported that NOC Global Education has completed overseas trips to New Zealand and Cuba and is currently on a third trip in Bali.

Vice President for Financial Affairs Anita Simpson provided the monthly financial report as well as information on residential housing rates, rental property, facility rental, and campus master plan information.

Jason Johnson, Vice President for Student Affairs, reported that NOC had no COVID-19 cases at the present time.

The regents approved tenure for three faculty members, Mary Gard (Agriculture/Biological Science), Karri Morrill (Mathematics), and Stephanie Spurlock (Mathematics). Diana Watkins said the tenure request was recommended by the Division Chair from their teaching area.

The regents also approved Cheer as a competitive sport at NOC Tonkawa and NOC Enid. Both campuses currently have a cheer program, the new distinction allows them to participate in NJCAA sanctioned events starting in Jan.

Regents approved a food service contract with Aladdin Food Services. Aladdin started the with NOC in

The regents also approved the declaration of numerous books from the Tonkawa library as surplus property. The books will be sold at auction at a later date.

NOC's regents also approved the rates for residential properties, facility rentals and facility usage fees.

The room and board rates for residential housing were approved for the 2022-23 school year. Rates did not change from this past year.

Regents also approved the Master Plan, a requirement from the Oklahoma State Regents that lays out potential capital projects. Those projects include campus renovations, transportation, and facility upgrades.

Regents also approved the meeting schedule for 2022-23.

The next regents' meeting is set for July 20 in Tonkawa at 1 p.m.

Tonkawa library transformation underway

The Vineyard Library at Northern Oklahoma College Tonkawa is undergoing a transformation into a contemporary NOC Student Learning Commons.

The library remodel is the first significant project emerging from the Building a Better NOC initiative. NOC President Dr. Clark Harris explained the plan for the transformation of the

library at the April 27th Board of Regents meeting in Tonkawa.

Harris added, "This will all happen from the efforts of the NOC Foundation and a generous donation from a NOC supporter as well as funding from a government grant."

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regents approved naming the space the Pickens Learning Commons in recognition of the substantial gift and continued collaborative partnership of Hugh and Dr. S. J. Pickens.

Work began in May in the hopes of the remodel completion for the fall semester.

"The library at NOC Tonkawa is at a pivotal crossroads with rows and rows of outdated books not being used by today's students and the need for individual and small group study areas in a dynamic environment," said Dr. Clark Harris. "The library could greatly benefit from a fresh look. This project is a perfect example of connecting NOC's core values of personalized education, continuous improvement and community and civic engagement into one transforming project."

"The new NOC Student Learning Commons will improve the student and employee quality of life by bringing more access to current technology and increase distributed study areas. The Student Learning Commons will possess the "Wow" factor in student recruitment as well as prospective students and families tour the campus, while the new access to learning spaces will aid in retention and improved graduation rates. The Cultural Engagement Center (CEC)

In regard to the donation, the NOC board of and current library will be blended into one space while retaining the glass dividing walls," he added.

> The project will include new technology, study tables and chairs, soft loveseats and chairs, new reception area, shelving, and carpet.

> It will also include the addition of two new permanent murals totaling 100'x20' by artist Yatika Starr Fields along with a constant collection of various art works from the Doctor Pickens Museum, Inc. to be on long-term display. Fields has already created two existing murals in the Cultural Engagement Center, commissioned by the Doctor Pickens Museum in November 2020 and completed in June 2021.

> "We are so excited to continue to partner with Hugh Pickens and the Doctor Pickens Museum, said NOC Vice President for Development and Executive Director to the NOC Foundation Sheri Snyder. "We are grateful for friends such as the Pickens who have chosen to share their gifts with us."

> When completed, the Pickens Learning Commons will include the Cultural Engagement Center, Testing Center, career and transfer services, library services, enhanced technology, tutoring services, and an art gallery.

Library book sale set for Aug. 4-7

An enormous book sale filling the Foster-Piper Fieldhouse and book drive are in the works at NOC Tonkawa. NOC needs your assistance through donations, attending the sale and volunteering.

The library at Northern Oklahoma is undergoing a great transformation to meet the needs of today's college students. The library staff and volunteers have weeded out over 20,000 books from the NOC library that will be sold Aug. 4-7 at a massive book sale.

The new-found library space will provide enhanced student study areas, new technology, and will be transformed into the Pickens Learning Commons. This will become a focus area for students at NOC.

NOC will be accepting donations of books and media to benefit the library project. Donations will serve two purposes. Some newer, well-kept books, DVDs and CDs will be added to the library's collection if there is a need and if they meet the same standards as those required of purchased materials. The collection will be greatly enhanced by the addition of newer, donated books.

Many of the donations will not be added to the collection, but will be sold at a large book sale to fund purchasing needed books and digital library resources for students. The digital resources will be used by students, faculty and employees on all campuses. Donations judged not suitable for the collection or the sale will be discarded. Books need to be provided in boxes

or tubs to allow easy transporting to the library/sale. Once accepted, donations are property of NOC and cannot be returned to the donor.

Books and other appropriate materials will be accepted in locations in Ponca City, Tonkawa, Blackwell, Enid, and Stillwater. Drop off locations will be provided at a later date. Donations will be accepted July 28-Aug. 4.

Check NOC's website for detailed guidelines for donations and any restrictions with the sale at https://www.noc.edu/library/booksale. NOC will be able to accept hardcover and paperback books for adults (Books for teens and children will be put in the sale), contemporary and classic fiction, popular & research-oriented nonfiction such as science, social science, biographies, history, and self-improvement and DVDs, Blue Ray discs, music and audio books on CD.


NOC will not be able to accept books in poor condition (stained, broken spins, yellowed, moldy, torn), encyclopedias, dictionaries, outdated textbooks, reference or research books (older than 2012), Readers Digest condensed books, magazines and journals, audio cassettes and VHS tapes, computer games or computer equipment or books discarded by other libraries. NOC asks that you take some time to evaluate your donation, as there will be many books that need to be sorted for the sale.



She started her RN career at Bass Baptist Hospital. She worked as a surgery RN at St. Mary's Regional Medical Center in Enid.



Michael attended NOC from 2017-19 pitching two years for the Mavs.


After graduating from NOC, Michael pitched two years at Lamar University before attending OU this year as a graduate student.
