To be eligible, students must be nominated by their college president to the All-USA Academic Team. Nominees must be eligible to graduate during the 2023 academic year and hold a minimum of a 3.50 cumulative grade point







### **United States Marshal Clayton Johnson** speaks to criminal justice students

of Oklahoma Clayton Johnson spoke to NOC Criminal Justice students Wednesday, March 29.

Johnson, an NOC graduate, has served law enforcement over 30 years as a police officer, police chief, and United States Marshal.

He spoke to three criminal justice classes, the first he spoke about his journey to police chief and how NOC helped him achieve his goals.

For the second class, he talked in depth about the function of the United States Marshal Service and tackles some myths about the marshal service.

In the last class, he talked about the investigatypes of marshal investigations.

"We are so thankful that Clayton spoke to our

United States Marshal for Northern District students," said NOC Criminal Justice Instructor Troy Cochran. "It gives them first-hand knowledge of all facets of law enforcement. He is a proud NOC alum and I am always excited when he speaks to our students."

# Phil Chalmers hosting criminal profile seminar at NOC April 25

Noted criminal profiler and true crime writer Phil Chalmers will host a seminar at Northern Oklahoma College Tonkawa April 25.

The event, organized by NOC Criminal Justice Instructor Troy Cochran, will be held at the Renfro Center from 8 a.m. - 4 p.m. with lunch provided. Lunch will be provided by the NOC Student Organization Criminal Justice Society.

Tickets to the event are \$149 each, \$40 for NOC students.

Chalmers, who specializes in profiling dangerous people, is the author of the Teen Killer Whisperer and hosts the Where the Bodies are Buried Podcast.

The seminar will include extremely graphic content including images of sex, violence, torture, and death. Attendees must be 18 years and older.

Training topics include causes, warning signs, and triggers of today's dangerous killers. Also covered are school shooting trends, school safety plans, and many others.

The seminar will go live on Zoom with school shooters and serial killers.

The seminar is designed for law enforcement, school resource officers, dispatchers, counselors, probation officers, social workers, and victim's advocates.

Singles or families making less than \$60,000 per year qualify for the free service.

The Cultural Engagement Center (CEC) is hosting the Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) program. The CEC is located in the library in the Vineyard Administration/Library building.

Interested parties need to bring a photo ID for all filers; Social Security cards and birthdates for taxpayer, spouse, and dependents; W-2 forms; 1099 forms; receipts for childcare costs, education expenses, and other deductions; checking account and routing number for refund; and

Thursday, April 13 is the final day for North- 1095-A, -B, or -C healthcare coverage or exemption.

> Tax preparation is done by appointment only. Please contact Cara Beth Johnson at 580.628.6340 or carolyn.johnson@noc.edu. Tax preparers are available from 5 p.m. - 8 p.m. No drop off's will be accepted, individuals must be present during tax preparation.

> Barbara Nickles is the VITA site coordinator and NOC students Haley Merhoff, Graeme Rios, and Rhylan Wright will assist her in preparing the tax returns. All have taken and passed all the required IRS tax preparer coursework.


