What makes NOC life-changing?

Affordability with Quality Education. I came to Northern to play drums in the Roustabouts. My father Ted Matson started the very 1st Roustabout Scholarship with matching funds from Conoco. That lent me the affordability to attend NOC while obtaining a quality education that allowed me to transfer my credits and attend a four-year college. Northern provides academic excellence, a very involved and supportive community, a lot of extracurricular student opportunities, and last and definitely not least...a Dedicated Faculty. Low faculty to student ratio provides personal attention and support to give students the ability to push their education endeavors to the fullest potential. That is my assessment on what makes Northern Oklahoma College a life-changing experience.

What advice would you give new alumni and/or students?

A couple bits of advice and keys to success that I share with my students:

- 1. Always bring the "P Factor" (Passion Factor). You should go into the classroom with a passion to learn and to outwork your competition, not only in the classroom, but in life and in everything you do. When you are finished with your education (even though you never stop learning) you will have a wide variety of other people competing for the job you are wanting, so the P Factor will play a big part in your success.
- 2. Time management. Get organized and set out blocks of time in your day for morning routines, classes, studying, projects/homework, exercise, personal/free time, work, and social time. It is important to set clear goals, prioritize tasks, set deadlines, curtail distractions, and take small breaks. I like to walk around the NOC circle to just walk around and get away from my computer screen.
- 3. Learn to Say No. Understand your limits and avoid overcommitting yourself. Politely decline tasks or activities that do not align with your goals or priorities.





In a few short sentences tell us about yourself.

I am a single parent with three grown adult kids (22-26 yrs old). I became a proud grandfather in December 2023. I have coached all of my kids in all different sports... volleyball, football, baseball, softball, basketball, tennis, and most important, life. My family is the most important part of my life.

I am the Director of the Digital Media Institute at Northern Oklahoma College. I have won several awards, including a Telly (equivalent to an Oscar for Digital Media), Audience Choice Award in the Remington Park 25th Anniversary Video Contest, a DaVinci Fellowship Award for outstanding creativity in the classroom and a NISOD Excellence Award. I

have also been named as an NOC Distinguished Faculty Member, four times nominated for the Oklahoma Gold Medal for Excellence in Teaching Award and was nominated for Digital Tutors Instructor of the Year.

I graduated from The University of Oklahoma with a film degree. While at OU I was the President of the RUF/NEKS (oldest male spirit group in the U.S.). They are the guys who drive the Sooner Schooner and shoot off the Shotguns during the games. I have been in the television and film industry for more than thirty years. I was very involved in the film industry while in Breckenridge Colorado. I worked on several extreme ski films and was on-set for Christmas Vacation and Dumb and Dumber while filming scenes in Summit County. I also served as the Executive Assistant to the Director of the Breckenridge Festival of Film. I have worked as a freelance V/FX artist, motion graphics artist, and editor for a lot of independent film projects. I also am very involved with the Tonkawa Film Festival, I sponsor the Epic Shorts Student Film Festival and the 48 Hour Film Competition. My most recent local film credit was working on the Proof of Concept Film, Redemption Oklahoma.

What makes NOC life-changing?

Brad came to NOC after what he'd say was "not much attention to grades in high school," where his interests had been athletics and livestock shows. "The faculty at NOC, specifically Dr Carver and Mary Perks, took an interest in me." Brad says, "In a subtle way they introduced me to goals and objectives which created a drive to achieve not only good grades but a vision of what I wanted to do with my life." He feels NOC has created an education environment that is very personalized which makes it unique among colleges. The care that the NOC faculty shows in their students provides a place which allows students to find direction and soar in their education as well as life beyond their experiences at NOC.

What advice would you give new alumni and/or students?

Brad's advice to any alumni would be to consider what NOC has given to you and possibly for your family. Realizing what you received, then considering giving back to the institution that gave you such a great start so others can receive the opportunity that was granted to you. Whether that be financially through the foundation or volunteering your time and skills by involvement in events and organizations, the reward for doing so is especially grand!

His advice to students would be to make time and allow faculty to connect with you. Their advice, assistance and direction will prove invaluable not only in your success at NOC but long term in your career. As a student you will only receive from your education what you put in and that goes for the effort to create relationships in addition to your grades. The faculty is extremely helpful and have the power to make your time at NOC very valuable and enjoyable.

Tell us about you.

The youngest of three children, Brad was raised on a farm west of Tonkawa and graduated from Tonkawa High School in 1983. Growing up on the farm he not only learned a strong work ethic but found an industry, Agriculture, that continues to hold his interest. He then attended and graduated from NOC in 1985 with an Associates of Science and went on to graduate from Oklahoma State University in 1987, majoring in Ag Economics with a minor in accounting. After college, Brad wanted to find employment in banking. However, the Oklahoma banking industry was still struggling so Brad joined John Deere Credit where he served as a financial representative covering a territory in Arkansas. Knowing Arkansas wasn't for him, he returned home in 1989 and began his career as a loan officer at Service Bank in Tonkawa. In 2002, he took an opportunity with Central National Bank of Enid - Blackwell where he grew his knowledge of the banking industry and many Agricultural relationships in the region while ascending to the position of Vice President. In 2003,

Brad was presented a great opportunity, his present position as the President and Region Manager of First National Bank of Oklahoma. Brad is a stockholder and director of First National Bank of Oklahoma, which is led by Patrick T. Rooney. "Pat has given me an opportunity of a life time and supported me in a way that has allowed us to impact the communities we serve in ways not otherwise possible."

Community involvement is very important to his values, and Brad enjoys offering time, leadership and resources for many organizations in the area. At First National Bank of Oklahoma, community involvement and efforts are ranked high on the bank's list of priorities. Through TDA he's enjoyed many relationships and by teamwork many objectives have been accomplished. 

As a first-generation college student, she found the support and guidance through NOC to build a strong academic foundation that would carry her through her postgraduate degree. Michelle graduated from NOC in 1992 with an Associate of Science, followed by



earning a Bachelor of Science in Secondary Education - Business Professions from Oklahoma State University in 1994.

After working several years as a classroom teacher, she earned a Master of Science in Occupational & Adult Education from Oklahoma State University in 2000. Michelle later achieved a Doctorate of Education in Instructional Leadership from North Central University in 2014.

For almost three decades, Michelle has focused her work on career and technical education, workforce development and economic development. She started as a classroom teacher in 1996 at Okmulgee High School. The following year, Michelle began teaching at Green Country Technology Center, also in Okmulgee. Dr. Keylon left the classroom to join the Oklahoma Department of Career and Technology Education in 2000. She was the State Program Administrator for vocational business, marketing, and information technology programs. She was responsible for strategic leadership, program development and provided support to numerous educational programs across the state, ensuring they met the highest standards of quality and accreditation. In 2005, she was given the opportunity to join Francis Tuttle Technology Center as the Director for Information Technology Programs. Over her 19-year tenure at Francis Tuttle she has taken on the roles of Adult Career Development Director, Executive Director of Instruction, Assistant Superintendent of Instruction, and Deputy Superintendent. In 2019, she became the fourth superintendent of Francis Tuttle. Her role has been to provide leadership for program development, curriculum design, instructional delivery, and staff development. Her leadership extended to emergency operations planning, strategic planning, budgeting, staffing and culture development. As the

superintendent, she maintains a relentless pursuit of excellence, a dedication to students and educators, and a commitment to educating the future workforce.

Keylon's family includes her partner, Jason Orr, her son Kolton, who is currently a junior at Oklahoma State University majoring in Geology and her daughter Kinley who is a junior at Deer Creek High School. Scott Morris

Scott Morris, a Tonkawa High School graduate, earned his Associate of Science degree from Northern Oklahoma College in 1991.

After a stellar career at Tonkawa High School, he followed the footsteps of his father, Gilbert Morris, and played basketball for the Northern Oklahoma College Mayericks.

After finishing his twoyear career at NOC, Morris continued his playing career at the University of Science and Arts in Chickasha where he played both basketball and golf. Morris then returned to NOC as



the men's assistant coach under Mick Weiberg from 1993-95. While earning his Master of Education degree at UCO he served as an assistant coach for Dan Hays at Oklahoma Christian University.

He then returned to NOC Tonkawa in 2000 for one season as the women's assistant coach under Greg Krause before being named the first head coach of the NOC Enid women's basketball program in 2001.

Morris and wife Summer then moved to Enid where he started the NOC Enid program from scratch and coached the Lady Jets from 2001-2020. He also taught Math at NOC Enid.

Over 19 years at NOC Enid, Morris' teams would accumulate 456 wins (averaging 24.0 wins per season), 12 conference championships, 12 NJCAA All-Americans, four Region-2 Championships and five National Tournament berths.

The Lady Jets reached Final Four appearance in 2011. The Lady Jets also achieved academic excellence by winning four NJCAA national academic titles and two runner-up finishes with over fifty individual academic All-Americans.

Morris and wife Summer currently live in Stillwater where he coaches the Stillwater High School Boys Basketball Team. They have three children Bryce, 22, Brennen, 19, and Avery, 14.
